



Angela Merkel Retires as Chancellor of Germany

How many American politicians are you aware of who have a doctorate in quantum chemistry? Well, here's a German one who does -- Angela Merkel! In 2005, she was the first woman to take the job of leading Germany. In the years since then, she has presided over Germany's successful outcome after the 2008 financial crisis and the Eurozone debt crisis, and set an example for how to treat refugees from Syria and Africa -- an example that makes the US look like an uncaring, passive observer by comparison. Merkel led 80 million Germans with quiet dignity and integrity. She did not abuse her position for personal gain; she did not denigrate her opponents, predecessors, or successors. She lived, spoke, and dressed modestly -- what you would expect from a scientist. When she announced her resignation at the conference of the Christian Democratic Union party, delegates there gave her a 6minute long standing ovation.

So far, as of the date of this writing,

Forty-four GCGAC members out of a total of about 100 members have received their covid-19 vaccinations. The plunger is nearly halfway through the hypo! Each month, we'll show the plunger making its way a little farther along to track our progress toward **gathering as a group** again.

This is a dramatic increase since last month's total of two. Yes, acknowledged, there was some low hanging fruit this month: The GCGAC's age distribution means that many of our members qualified for placement near the front of the vaccination line because of their age. *Manchmal hat man eben keine Wahl*. "Sometimes, you just don't have a choice!" You take the vaccine when you can get it.

"COVID Arm"

As more and more of our club membership get vaccinated, we now have an affliction less serious than the covid disease to focus on: "Covid arm." The formal medical name for the condition is "delayed subcutaneous hypersensitivity," which refers to a swelling near the



vaccination site, about a week after the shot was injected. The arm gets a hard, reddish, sometimes itchy and sensitive place. It happens more often in women than men. Normally, the swelling goes away in a few days, and the itch can be relieved with an antihistamine such as Benadryl. It is also said that this reaction happens more often with the Moderna vaccine than the Phizer vaccine (shown at left). Yet another reason to love the Germans!

Look at what they are doing to our bridge!



This photo from Karen Herrmann taken during a hike at South Yuba River State Park shows the Bridgeport covered bridge, uncovered, undergoing an extensive restoration. Kristina Wetherbee's husband, Marc, works as a State Parks Peace Officer. The Wetherbees live in the caretaker's cottage a stone's throw from the bridge and the noisy work being done there. So, by extension, this is *our* bridge! (See the connection?)

Electric VW Microbus!

The pre-1968 Volkswagen Bus went by many names: Type 2, Transporter, VW Van, 23-window Bus, Microbus, and in Germany, "Bulli." These vehicles have become scarce, and today, a classic 23-window Microbus in restored condition can fetch over \$100k. A German company, eClassics, has done a "concept" model VW Bus shown at right, except that instead of its original, woefullyinadequate 36 horsepower VW sedan motor, this bus has been retrofitted with a modern, 80 horsepower, all-electric drive train and several other conveniences: LED headlights, updated suspension, new gauges, leather upholstery, modern stereo, GPS navigation, effective brakes, and actual rustproofing. Top speed is about 80



mph and range is about 135 miles. The battery bank under the bus's belly pan and the conventional drive axles reduce the once-ample ground clearance of the original bus, but it lowers the center of gravity, making the new bus less top-heavy, especially in a cross wind. *[As me how I know! -- ed]*

eClassics' stock in trade is not the concept microbus, but rather a modernized, electrically-propelled VW Beetle, which they call the "*e-Käfer*." (*Käfer* in German means "Beetle.") It has similar luxurious upgrades, plus its top speed is 93 mph with a 155
