Heidelmann Lodge



Recently, Club member **Dennis Naumann** finished some major refurbishment work at the [Heidelmann Lodge](#) located on Donner Summit near the Sugar Bowl ski resort. This work included a top to bottom cleaning and important fire safety enhancements. But, you ask, what is the Heidelmann Lodge, and why was Dennis there, working? For that answer, we must consider some history:

In nineteenth-century Europe, only royalty and the very rich owned mountain chalets. Ordinary, working-class people could not access the beauty and serenity of the mountains. However, in 1895, as part of a socialist/proletariate movement, *Die Naturfreunde* (The Nature Friends) organization formed in Vienna to provide working people with places of recreation like the lords and barons had. Many German-speaking Europeans (including those from Hungary and Czechoslovakia) became members of *Die Naturfreunde*.

In early twentieth-century America, many immigrants from Europe brought skills and craftsmanship with them to their new homes in the US. In the San Francisco area was a substantial German-American craftsman population who found one another and formed the *Deutscher Arbeiter Bildungsverein, ABV* (German Workmen's Educational Association). Among those workmen was Dennis Naumann's grandfather. In 1912, a local chapter of *Die Naturfreunde* was founded. For recreation, club members would make outings to Mt. Tamalpais via ferry boat or railway to explore the then-rustic and uninhabited hills. After much searching, the Nature Friends found a shabbily built cabin with a perfect location and a nearby water spring. A Nature Friends member named Wilhelm Heidelmann bought the property on behalf of the Nature Friends Tourist Club. Club members, all volunteer labor, including Dennis's grandpa, renovated the cabin and its surroundings, and by 1917 had completely replaced the cabin with a new lodge built in the style of an alpine chalet. This lodge, the Nature Friends Clubhouse, eventually became called the Muir Woods Clubhouse.

What about the lodge on Donner Summit? In 1927, Nature Friends clubs in San Francisco, Oakland, and Los Angeles formed a coalition. The San Francisco and Oakland branch members often took long camping trips to the Sierras and determined a lodge like the one on Mt. Tamalpais was needed there in the Sierras. By 1931, volunteer Nature Friends club members had built a beautiful lodge near Norden, California, at Donner Summit, and named the lodge *Sierrahaus*. Heartbreakingly, in 1943, the *Sierrahaus* was destroyed in a fire. After the war, in 1947, work had begun to replace the *Sierrahaus*, and the new structure became known as Heidelmann Lodge. Foundation and framing were done by a contractor from Auburn, but all of the subsequent finish work was done by volunteers from the club, including Dennis Naumann's father, Frederick Horace "Dutch" Naumann, who was deeply involved in the construction, including installation of the lodge's boiler. From that time until now, repair and maintenance of the Heidelmann Lodge has been by volunteer Nature Friends members, who include our GCGAC member, Dennis Naumann. The sense of duty to volunteer for work at the Heidelmann Lodge had been instilled by Dennis's father and grandfather. It is a family tradition.

The Heidelmann Lodge is open to the public, but call first to make sure it is available to visit: (530) 426-9947. It is located at 19880 Donner Pass Road, Truckee, California. It is part of a complex of buildings called Tri Lodge, which includes the Claire Tappan Lodge built by the Sierra Club and Cal Lodge, originally built by student body from UC Berkeley.

The namesake of this street sign across the street from Weiss Brothers Nursery is **Herman Joerschke**, an immigrant from Germany born 1847. He owned property in what is now known as the Brunswick area of Grass Valley. He had three children, and his family owned and operated the Glenbrook Inn until his death in 1920; there also is rumored to have been a Joerschke Reservoir, although that might have been a whimsical name for a pond on his property. Now the question is, who was Maltman? Was he/she German, too?

SIEMENS

Siemens Mobility, a separately-managed branch of the Siemens company in **Munich, Germany**, has been awarded contracts worth \$3.4 billion from Amtrak to build 83 trainsets (engines plus cars) to be deployed in the USA to replace 50-year-old rolling stock in the Amtrak fleet. The locomotives will be hybrid battery, diesel, and catenary (overhead wires) electric using fully-integrated digital diagnostics for enhanced reliability, fuel economy, and emissions. The passenger cars will feature large panoramic windows, more comfortable seating, onboard wi-fi, safety enhancements, lifts for customers in wheelchairs, and many other new amenities in the German style. But, here's the *really* good news:

The new trainsets will be manufactured at Siemens Mobility's factory in **Sacramento, California**, (pictured at right, below) to comply with Federal Railroad Administration Buy America Standards. The factory employs more than 2,100 workers and uses its own a 2.1 MegaWatt solar installation to provide the majority of its needed power. If you are an expert welder of stainless steel, there is probably a place for you at Siemens in Sacramento. Delivery of the new rolling stock is scheduled for 2024. All aboard!
