## HAPPY WANDERERS' HIKING GROUP

The Happy Wanderers have been exploring the lower elevations the last few weeks. October 28 found us at Hidden Falls Regional Park outside of Auburn. November 11 found us exploring the Forest Hill Divide Trail. This is outside the other side of Auburn. **Volksmarsch Badges**. New Member: Michael Camerlingo

Austrian-American Hollywood Film Composer Erich Wolfgang Korngold



Erich Korngold was an important and influential composer of film scores for 16 Hollywood movies. He received Oscars for his scores for Anthony Adverse (1936) and The Adventures of Robin Hood (1938). Erich was a child prodigy, born in 1897 to a Jewish family in Brünn, Austria-Hungary (now the Czech Republic). He composed his first ballet at age 11 and his first orchestral score at age 14. Gustav Mahler called Korngold a "musical genius." He composed and conducted several works in Vienna. Unfortunately, in the 1930's, Austria was annexed by the Nazis and his family home in Vienna was confiscated. He moved to the US, just in time to escape persecution, in 1938. Working on *Robin Hood* for Warner Brothers probably saved his life. He stayed in America until World War 2 ended, and he became a naturalized US citizen. Influential? Yes. John Williams, the composer of the Star Wars (and many other) film scores, cited Erich Korngold as his inspiration.

Here's **Mike Silence**, Vice President of the GCGAC and also an active member of the Intermediate German Language class, displaying a map that he obtained while on his recent visit to Germany. The map is of particular interest to the members of the language class, because it shows places and villages referred to in one of the class's translation assignments, "Wahres und Legendäres," which is a collection of anecdotes and short stories written during the time of the Austrian-Hungarian Empire. The pre-Germany locations in the stories are not readily found on typical modern maps. Some villages have changed their names as the national boundaries shifted. The special new map adds an element of forensics to the translation assignment.

Speaking of Gute Bessurung, our old Pfriends, Pfizer and BioNtech are in the news, again. The latest is that they have developed an antiviral pill called Paxlovid that is claimed to reduce the risk of hospitalization and death by 89 percent in people at high risk of severe illness from covid. It is, to coin a phrase, the "morning after pill" for the unvaccinated. Unfortunately, it is somewhat experimental and still awaiting approval from the FDA for use in this country. Pfizer has asked for special emergency authorization similar to what it received for its vaccine. Other drug companies such as Merck have also applied for authorization of their own antiviral pills and might actually beat Pfizer to market, this time. If approved, Paxlovid would complete the three-pronged defense against covid that includes physical barriers (e.g., masking), vaccine, and treatment for the infected.

## Kartoffelpuffer and Latke -- What's the difference?

They're both a form of potato pancakes, made from grated potatoes, onions, and eggs — deep fried, and enjoyed with applesauce, as shown at right. Neither existed before the potato had been accepted in Europe as suitable for human consumption, in the late 18th century. (Previously, potatoes were considered livestock fodder.) In the early agrarian days in what is now Germany, farmers would typically fatten their geese for slaughter in early December, and use the rendered goose fat to fry these pancakes. Because of the timing, Latkes became associated with Jewish Hanukkah (which this year happens from November 28 until December 6). Devout Jews also relate the oil in which the Latkes are fried with the oil



referenced in the Miracle of the Oil in ancient scriptures (even though that was probably olive oil, and there were no Hebrew potatoes). Kartoffelpuffer (same pancakes) were associated with Lutheran and Catholic Christmas. So, if you would like to make some Kartoffelpuffer or Latkes, and if you strive for authenticity, you could try to find a large quantity of goose grease in which to fry them. If you make them early this December, you can celebrate Hanukkah. Make them in later December and celebrate Christmas! Have them under both names and honor both holidays!
